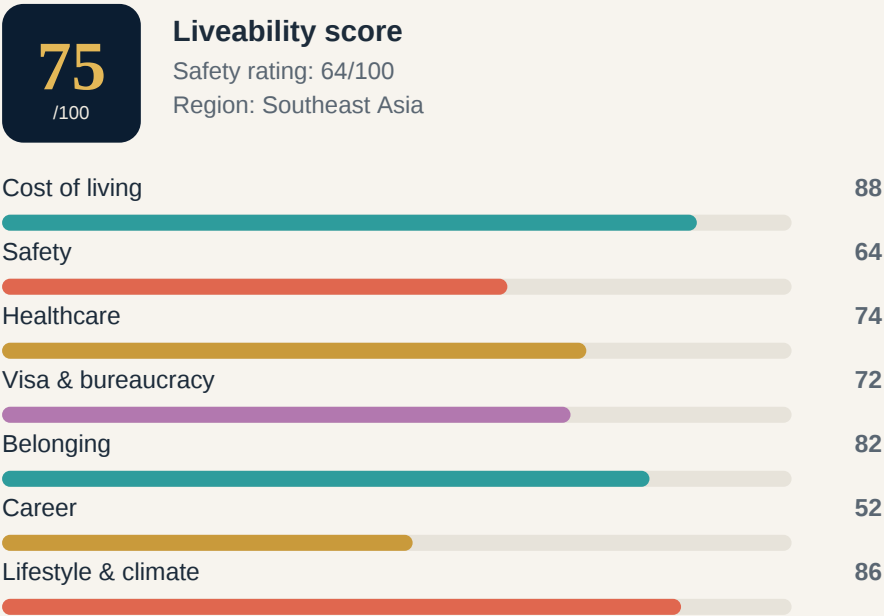

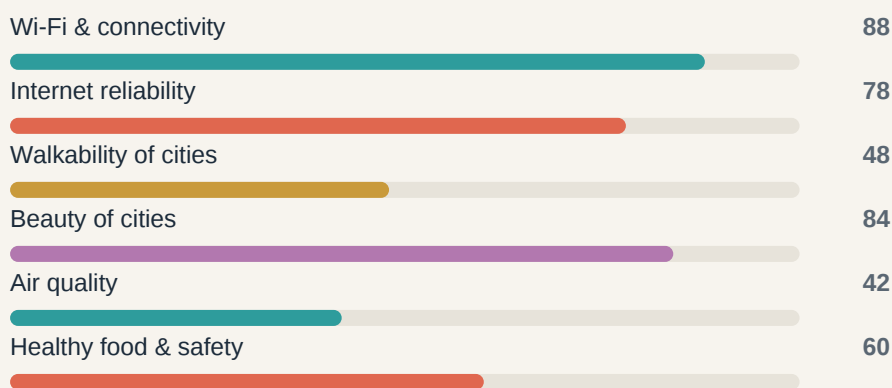

Retiring in Thailand

Retirement visas from age 50 with a modest deposit or income requirement; Chiang Mai and Hua Hin are established retiree hubs.

- › DTV five-year remote-worker visa
- › Long-Term Resident (LTR) visa with 17% flat tax for high-skilled
- › Thailand Privilege (Elite) visa 5–20 years
- › Foreign income remitted taxed; new rules under review

Affordable Move

You're moving on savings or a modest income, doing the paperwork yourself, and treating the first year as a test. You'll rent furnished, fly economy, ship almost nothing, and learn the language in group classes.

Pension or income letters certified and apostilled, police certificate, medical, birth and marriage certificates translated. Apply for the retirement or passive-income visa with a lawyer. Quote private health insurance for your age with pre-existing conditions declared.	
Long scouting stay	~6 wks
Six weeks in the town you'd live in, in the season you'd like least. Register with a GP or clinic, visit the hospital, price a pharmacy run, join a club, test the walk to shops.
